Why are we talking about this?

- Academic publishing is complicated, and it can be confusing
- Academic publishing has wide impacts: on authors, researchers, institutions, readers, and more
- Graduate students and other new researchers don't always come into their programs and roles with knowledge of these issues

Closed access



- Traditional, subscription-based academic publishing
- Online content is behind a paywall
- Funded through subscriptions. In an academic setting it is generally the institution's library that is paying to subscribe (not individual readers)

Open Access (OA)



- Free-to-read online scholarship (no sign-ins, no paywalls, no subscriptions)
- Associated with higher readership and higher citation rates than closed access!
- Funded through institutional subsidies and/or through APCs

Benefits of open access



APC



- Article Processing Charge
- Funding model used by some open access journals
- Authors pay these fees to the publisher; publishers use these fees to recover costs and to generate revenue
- APC costs vary and can range from nominal to exorbitant

Paying to publish??

That sounds potentially problematic 🤨

Does that mean anyone can pay to publish anything in open access journals?

Open vs closed - what does it mean for peer review and journal quality?

- Quality OA journals implement and follow rigorous peer review and editorial standards - just like quality subscription-based journals
- While APCs are part of publishing in many OA journals, a legitimate OA journal will not charge any fees until *after* your article is reviewed and accepted for publication

- With any journal you're considering - closed or open access - look for information about peer review policies on their website
 - What type of peer review do they use?
 - What does "peer reviewed" mean to them?

Predatory journal basics

Predatory journals?

“Predatory journals and publishers are entities that prioritize self-interest at the expense of scholarship and are characterized by false or misleading information, deviation from best editorial and publication practices, a lack of transparency, and/or the use of aggressive and indiscriminate solicitation practices”

Let's break it down

- **Prioritization of self-interest (\$\$\$)**

But not all for-profit publishers are predatory

- **At the expense of scholarship**

But failing to follow best practices in scholarly publishing isn't always a sign of bad intentions

- **Characterized by false or misleading information**

If a journal is deliberately misleading authors and readers, that's a very bad sign

- **Aggressive and indiscriminate solicitation practices**

These journals will email anyone and everyone they can, inviting article contributions - regardless of an individual's credentials or field

Notes: “predatory” terminology

Some consider for-profit publishers with high APC costs (and high profit margins) to be predatory - unrelated to journal quality. (That’s not what we’re focusing on today.)

And note that some people prefer other terms instead of “predatory” - deceptive, exploitative, fraudulent, junk, etc



What are these journals trying to do?

They want to make money from your scholarly work without adding any value.

- Predatory journals charge publication fees without providing quality control (peer review) or publishing services such as copyediting, layout, and proofreading.
- They mislead authors by presenting themselves as providing these services.
- It isn't always easy to recognize a journal or publisher that is mis-representing itself

Predatory publishing: What's the impact?

1. Wasted money, including tax dollars and grant funds
2. Authors who publish with predatory journals may have the legitimacy of their scholarship called into question, which can seriously impact their careers
3. Un-reviewed scholarship is presented as having been vetted; readers are misled, which can have serious consequences

There are different types of predatory journals

- **Imposter:** a legitimate journal exists, but its title, ISSN, web design, URL (or a near-match of one of those) is used by a fully false organization with no relationship to the established journal
- **Hijacked:** a journal that was legitimate has changed management or changed editorial policy so that the content has drifted from legitimate to fraudulent
- **Zombie:** a legitimate journal that has ceased publication (often losing its domain name), and its title is resumed by a fraudulent actor
- And just plain old predatory journals that aren't pretending to be a different (legitimate) journal, but are still operating under deceptive practices

Many predatory journals claim to be open access.

And since many legitimate OA journals *and* predatory journals use APCs as their payment model, we have to be careful when selecting an OA journal to publish in

Tools and strategies for evaluating journal quality

Critical thinking skills are your first line of defense

If you receive an email solicitation to publish in a journal that you don't know, or if you see a call for contributions to a special issue from an unfamiliar publisher or journal, investigate **before** you consider submitting your work



Tips for handling potentially predatory solicitations

1. Research the journal before you consider responding
2. Don't click on links directly in the email (start with your search engine)
3. Look at the journal website - do you see red flags with language, grammar, or other issues?
4. Look at some of the journal's recently published content. Predatory journals may sometimes include scholarship that can stand on its own - but you may also see nonsensical or out-of-scope papers
5. Don't just read what the journal says about itself. Look for external information (lateral reading!). You can do this by using your preferred search engine to look up the journal
6. Still not sure? Need a second opinion? Check to see if your library provides support in this area

Gathering information about journals

- Use your search engine of choice to search for the journal, publisher, or conference name and the word “predatory”
- Check the Directory of Open Access Journals ([DOAJ](#))
- Check other academic search indexes - is the journal or its content included?
- [Wikipedia](#) can sometimes provide information about journal or publisher history/behavior (and links with documentation)
- Consult online tools like [Think. Check. Submit.](#), [Journal Evaluation Tool](#), or the [Hijacked Journal Checker](#)

But remember:

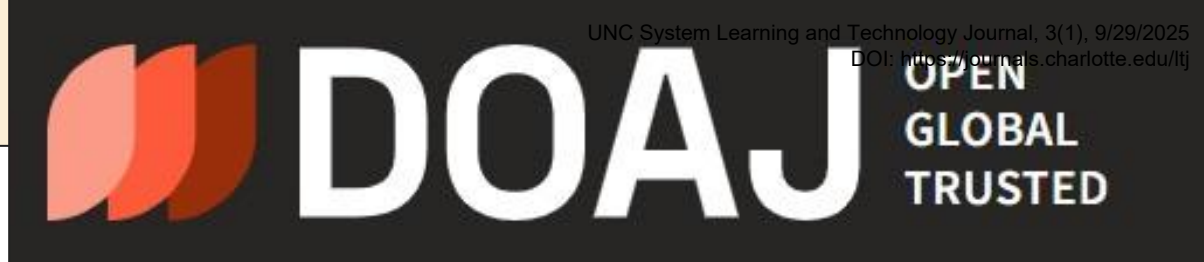
**Things can change over time (journal practices, publishers, editorial boards, etc)
And the internet doesn't know everything.**



Also note:

You don't have to use *all* of these strategies and tools every time you want to evaluate a journal

Is the journal indexed?

- Where does the journal say it is indexed? (check its website)
 - Are they actual, legitimate scholarly indexes?
- Where is the journal *actually* indexed?
 - Consider checking your preferred indexes or search systems to see if you can find content from the journal



Are you submitting your research to a trusted journal or publisher?
Is it the right journal or book for your work?

- Do you recognize the editorial board?
- Is the publisher a member of recognized industry initiatives? ([COPE](#), [OASPA](#), [DOAJ](#), others?)

- Offers a rubric and scoring sheet to aid in evaluating journal characteristics

Some websites track predatory journals

- Exercise judgement and critical thinking when using these sites/lists
- Consider who is creating and maintaining the list
- Look for the criteria used in creating the list
- How old is the list/site? Is it still updated and maintained?
- Example:
 - Retraction Watch [Hijacked Journal Checker](#)

Keep in mind - it might not be predatory, it might just be:

- **A vanity press:** generally pay-to-publish; no peer review or quality control is offered by the publisher
- **A commercial or marketing opportunity:** non-academic companies are increasingly reaching out to researchers, offering services to showcase or promote scholarship to the public through marketing or the creation of media (that you would be expected to pay for)
- **A legitimate scholarly publishing opportunity:** While it can be uncommon to see direct email solicitations from legitimate journals, it can happen!

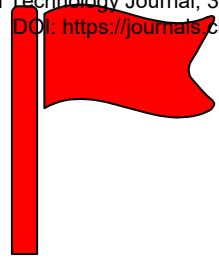

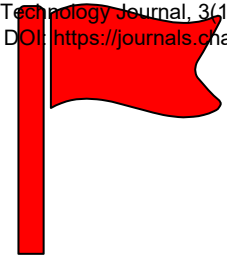

Has my information been harvested from a legitimate site?



1. Many predatory journals pull citation information from legitimate publications, then contact those authors directly
2. Watch out for solicitations that address you in a name format you associate with citations
3. These journals also sometimes use keywords to try to match your published article to their scope (with potentially hilarious results)

How much is this going to cost?

1. Are there APCs associated with this journal? If so, is there clear information about publication costs, currency used, and how payments are made?
2. Does the journal request payment in a currency that is associated with the country where the publisher claims to be located?
3. The use of APCs is a common practice in open access publishing - including with legitimate journals. Journal policies around costs should be transparent and easily accessible. If something seems fishy, avoid it!

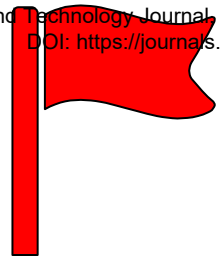

Is this journal *really* what it claims to be?

1. Pay careful attention to the publication title. Some predatory journals use titles that mimic existing - legitimate - journals. Some predatory journals even publish under the exact same titles as legitimate journals (imposters!)
2. Also consider that journals are sometimes transferred to new leadership or new publishers, and this can affect practices and quality in the future (hijacked! zombies!)
